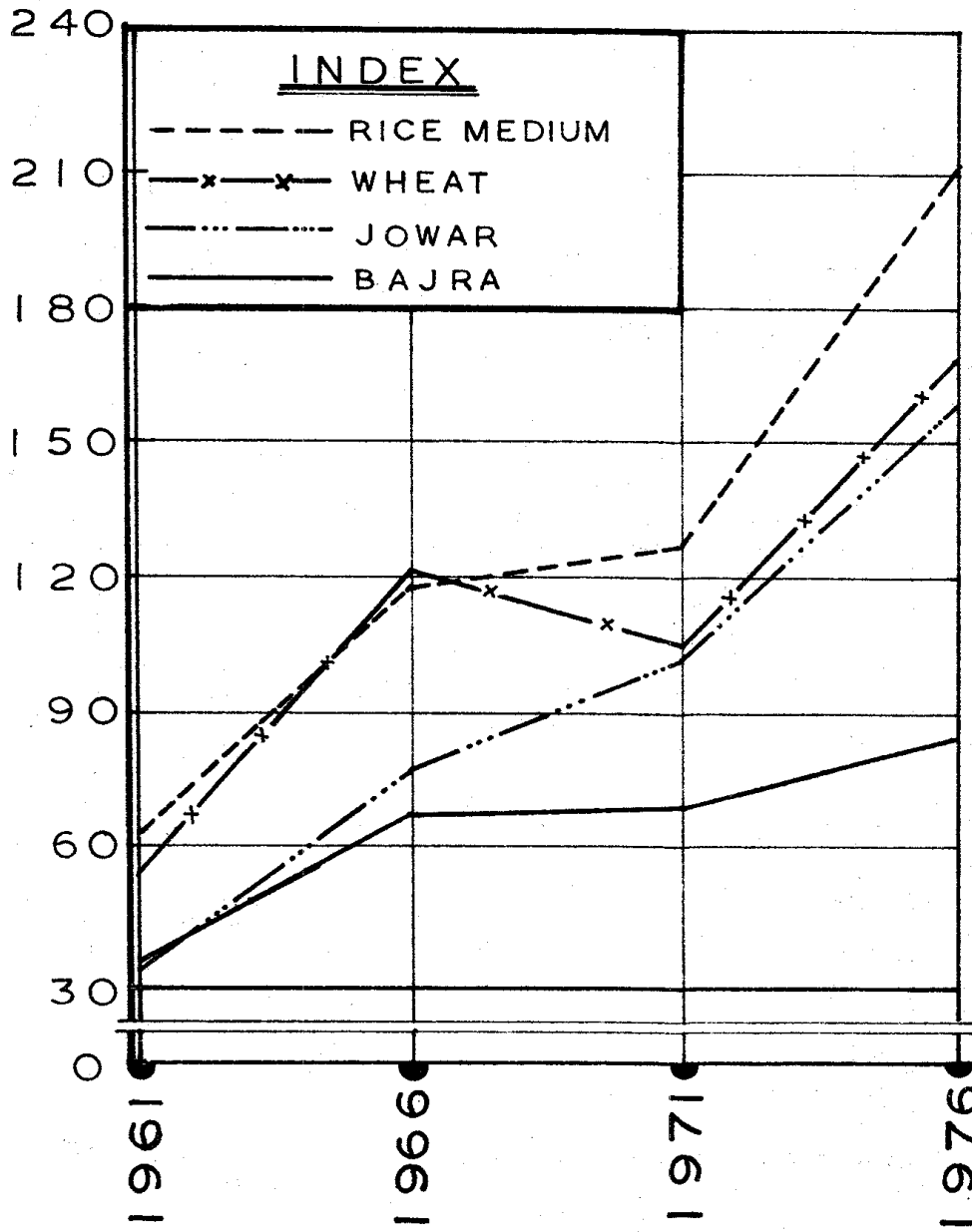

PERCENTAGE VARIATION OF LITERACY RATES



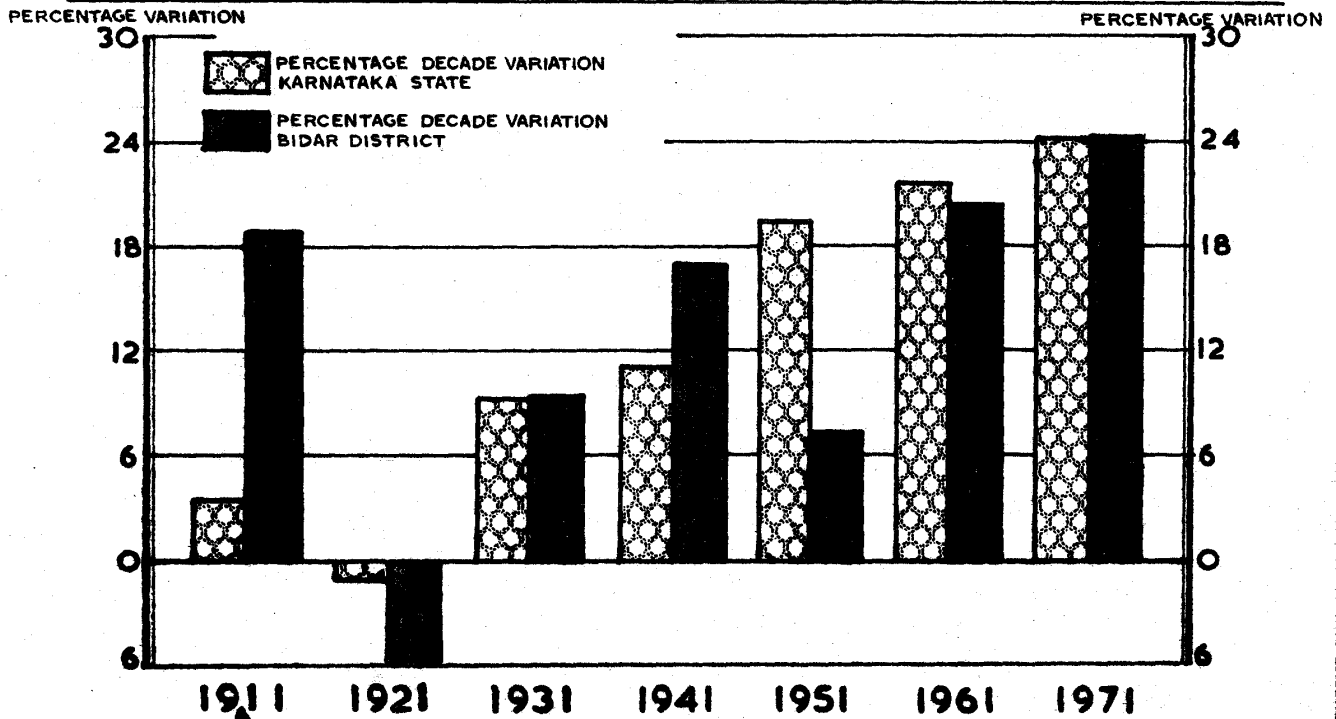

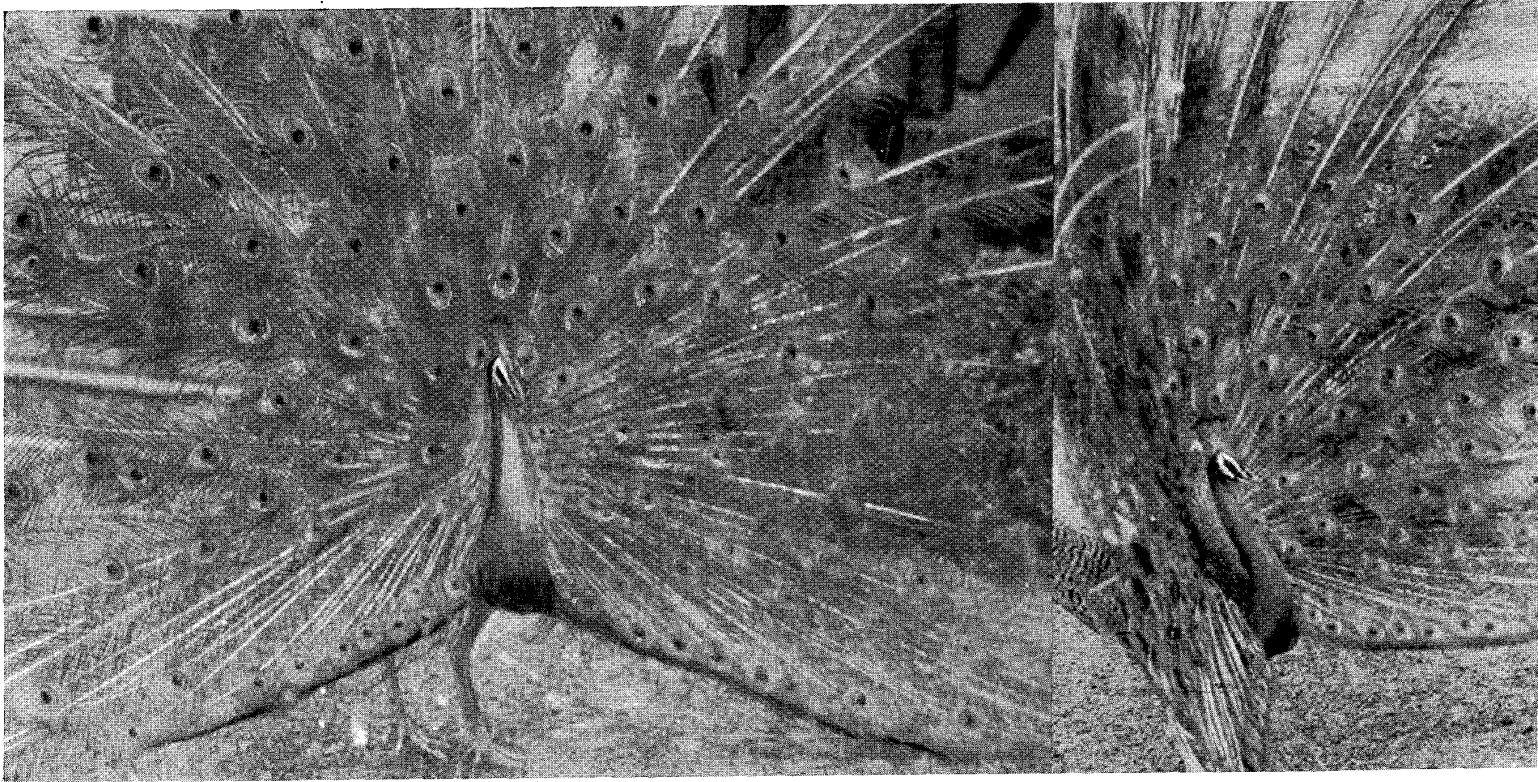
PERCENTAGE DECADE VARIATION OF POPULATION 1911 TO 1971



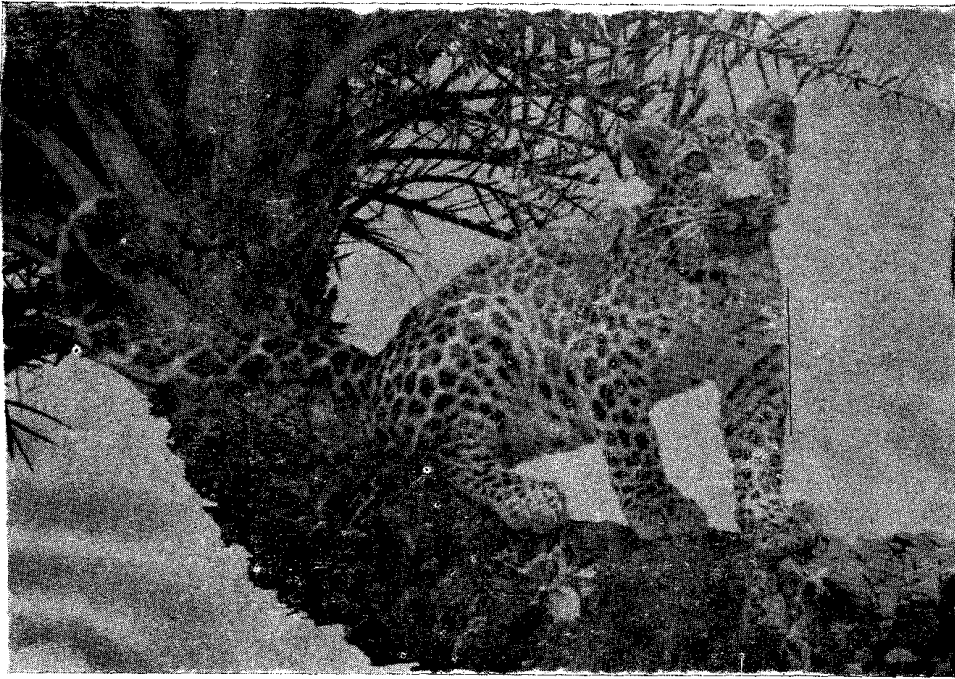

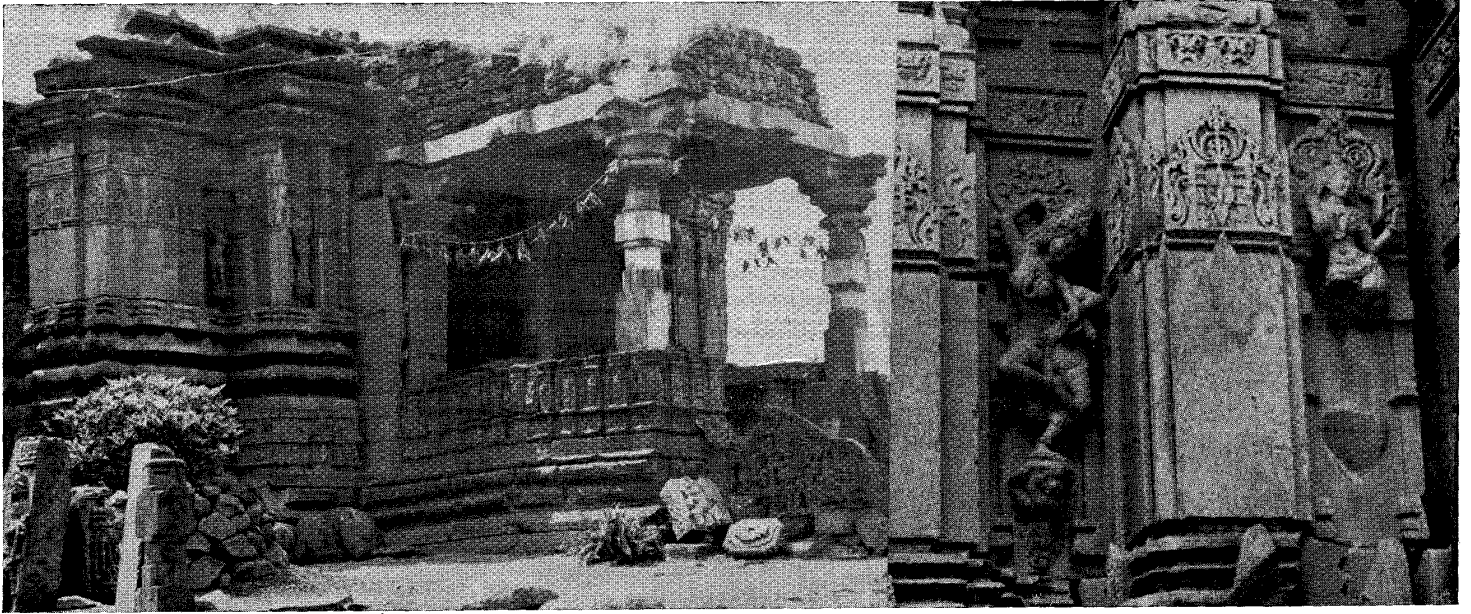

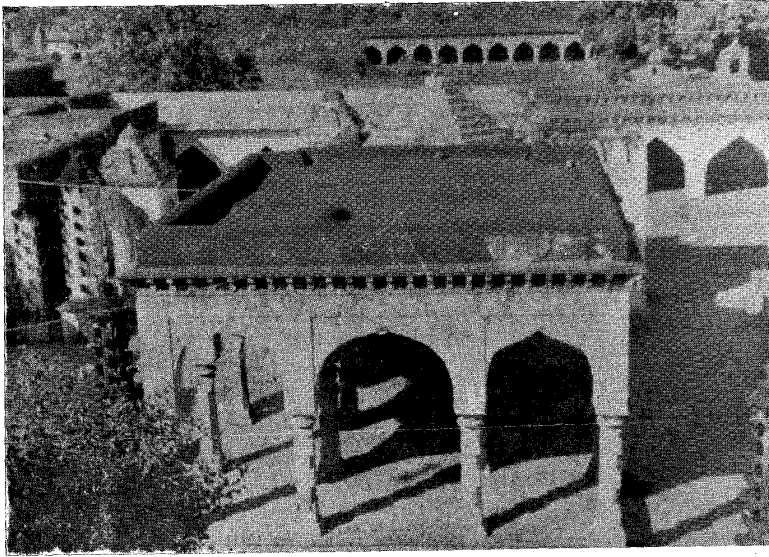

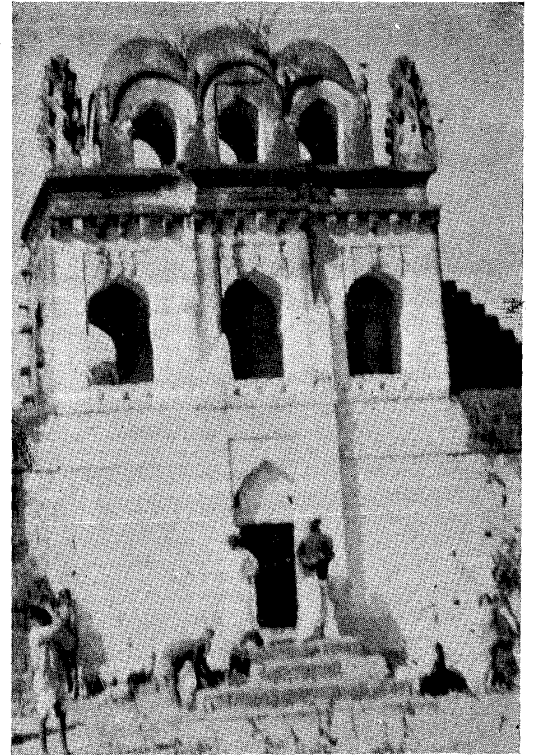

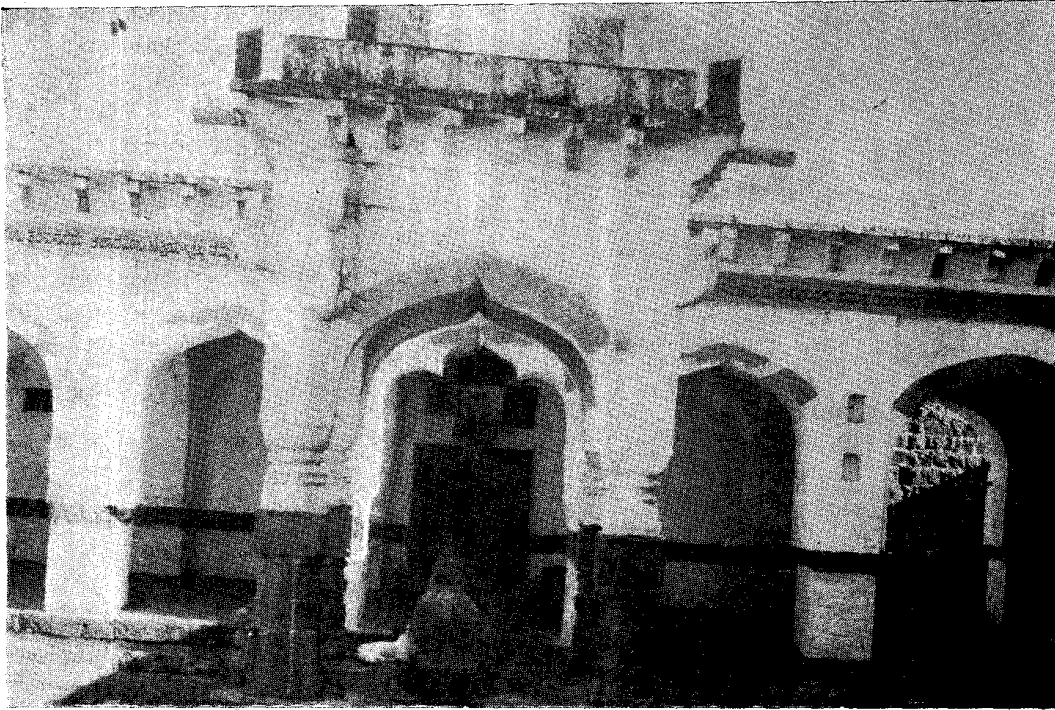

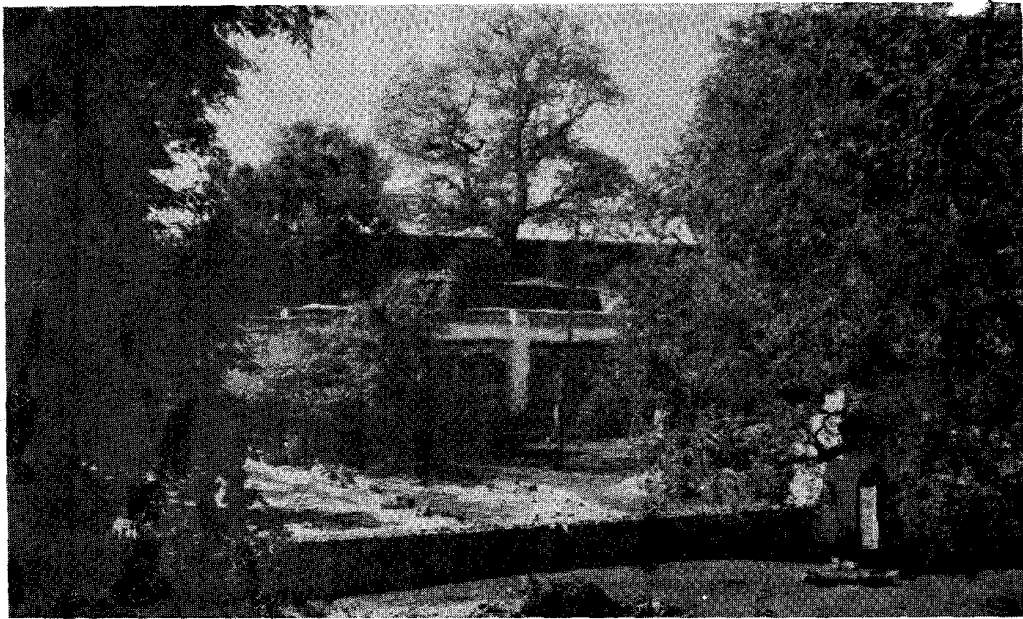

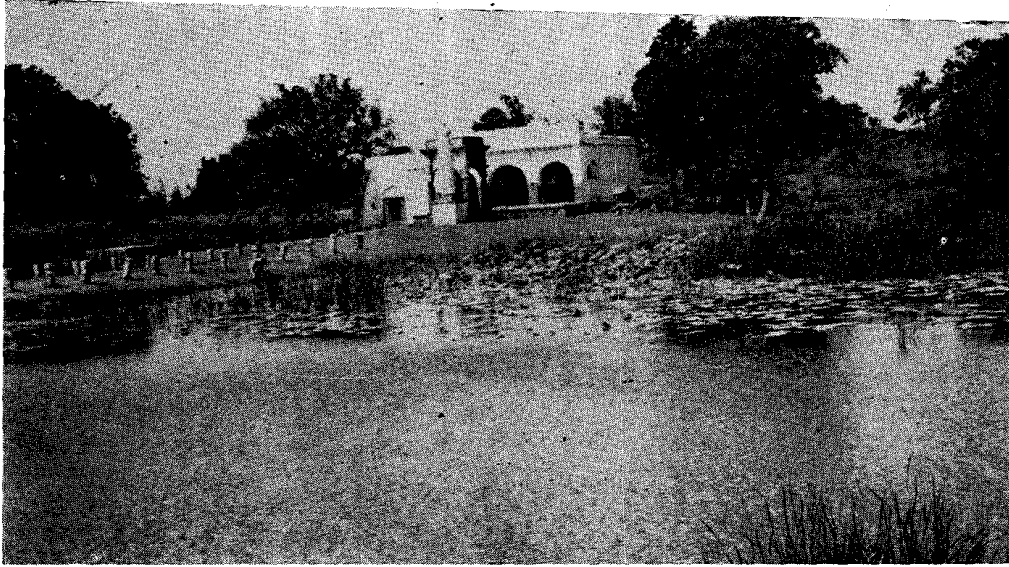

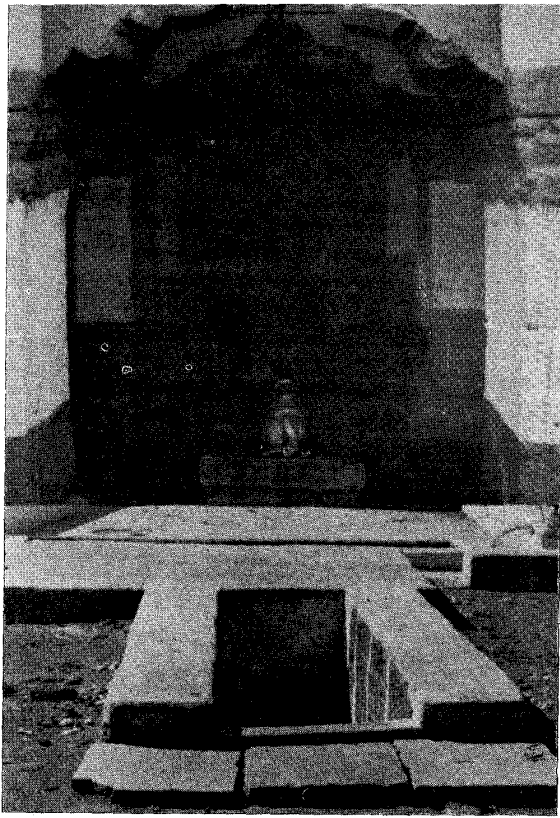

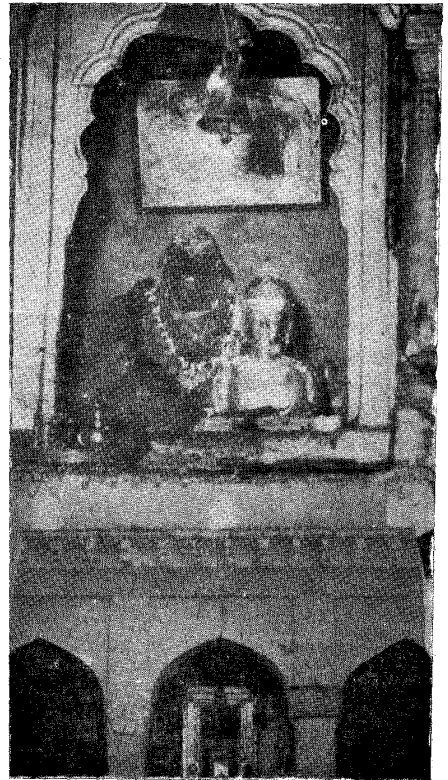

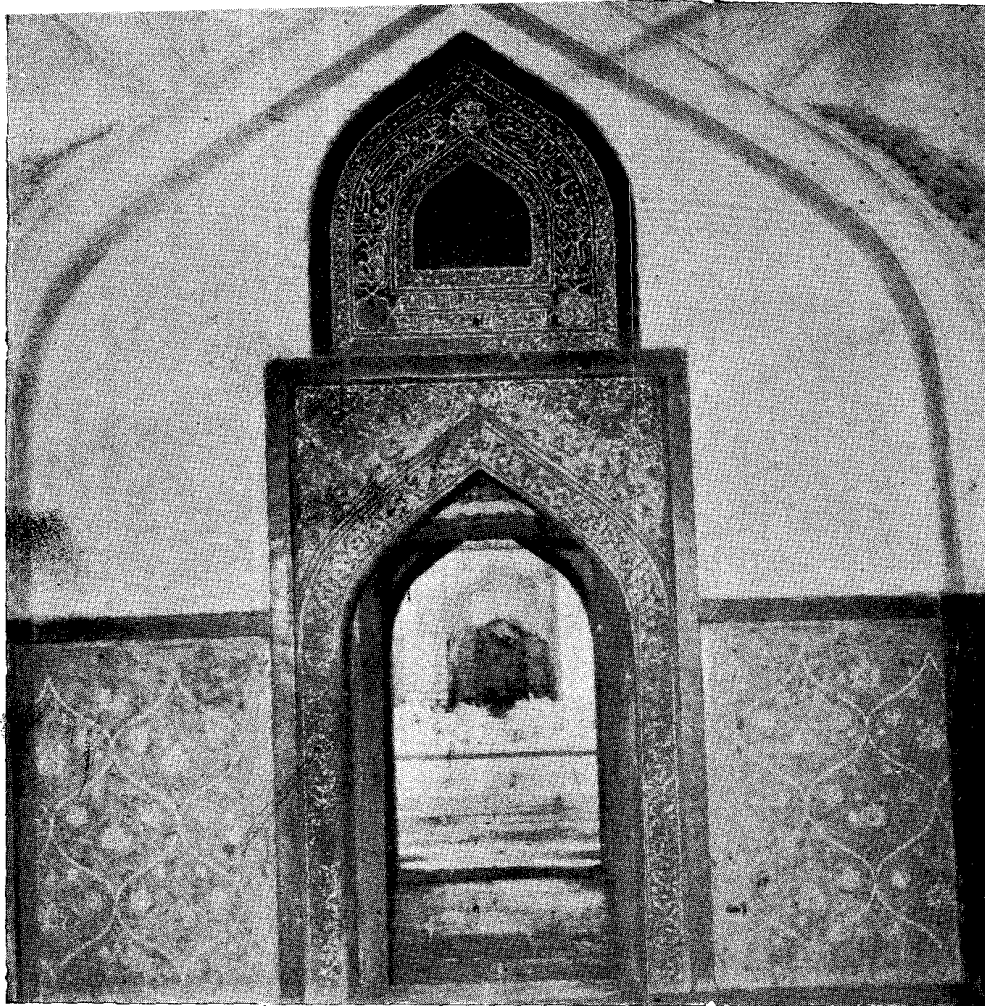

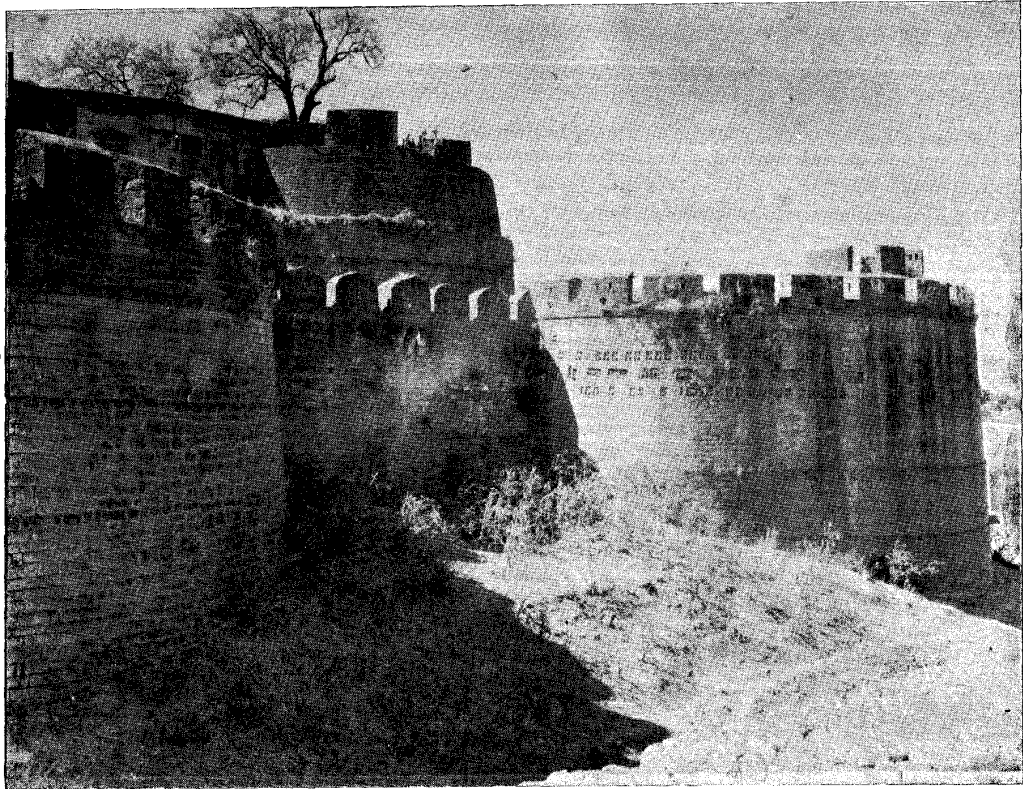

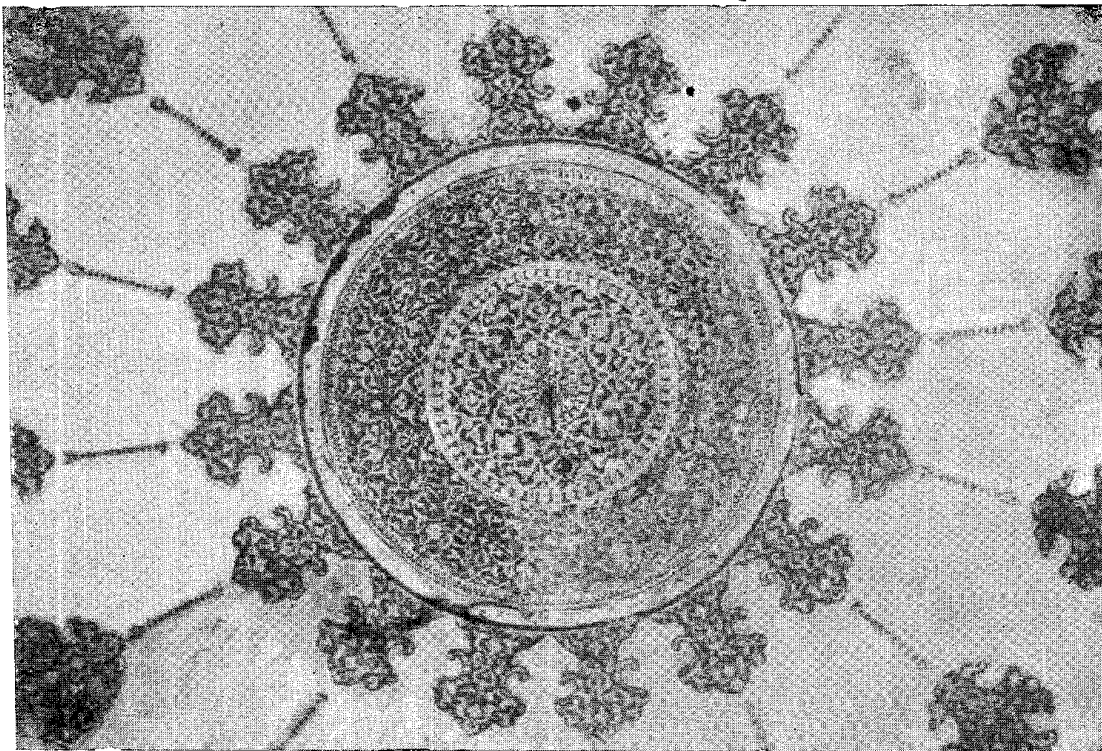

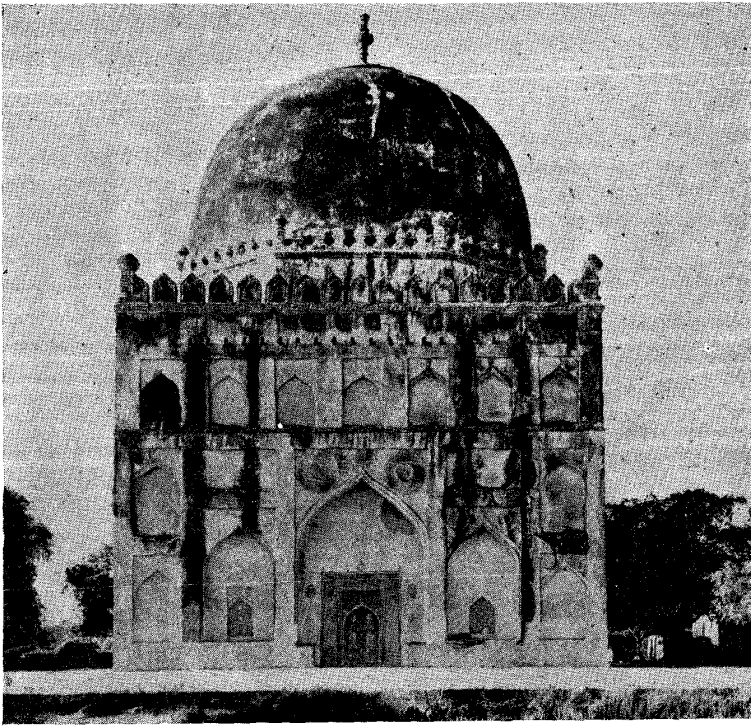

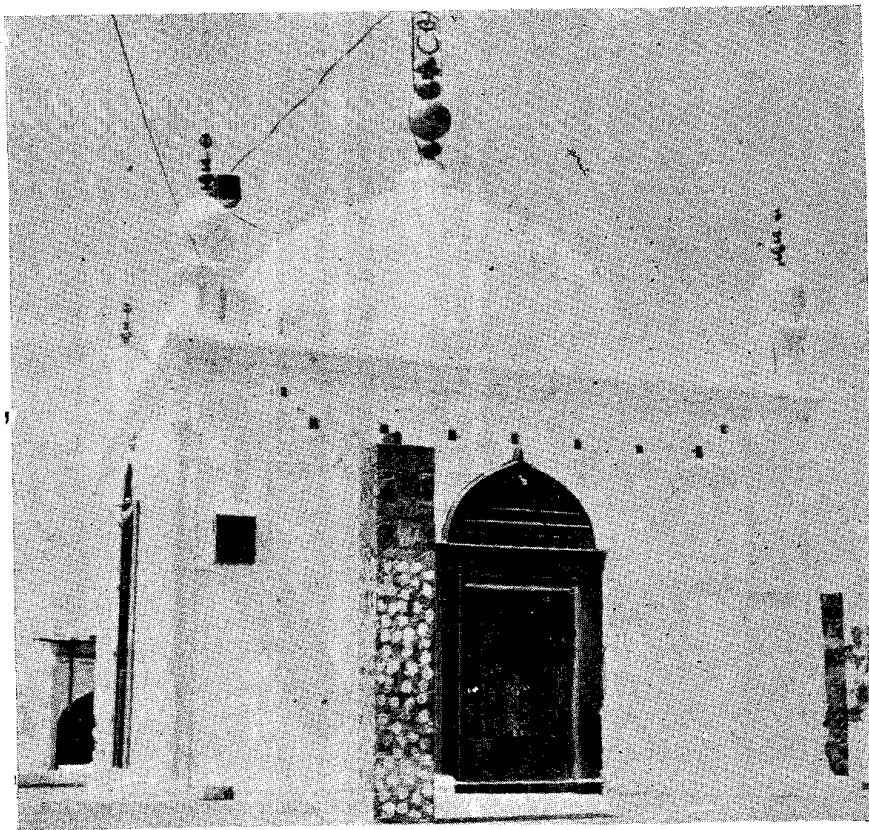

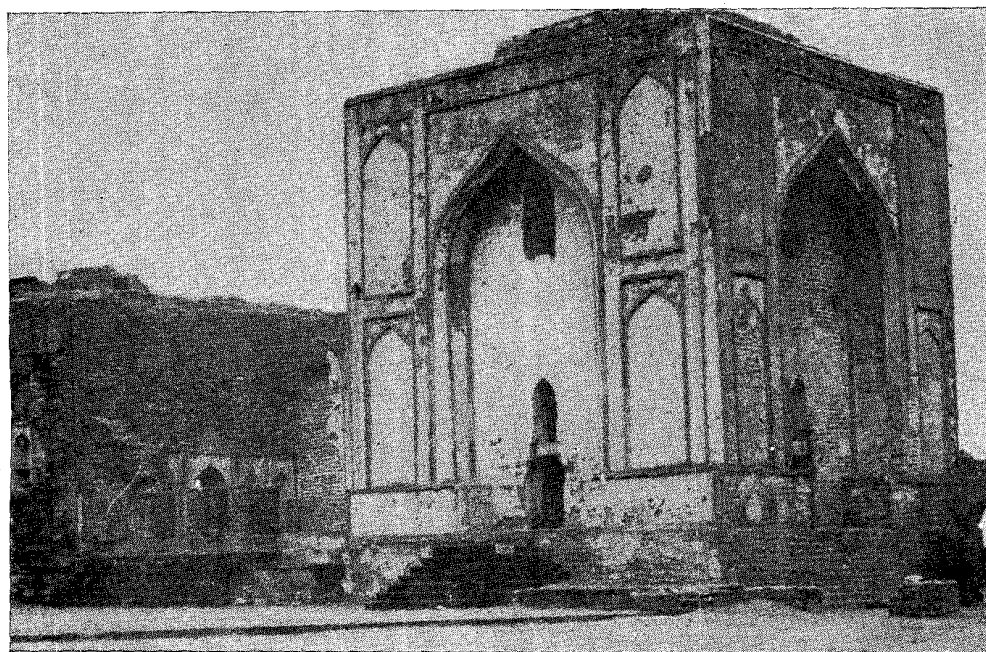

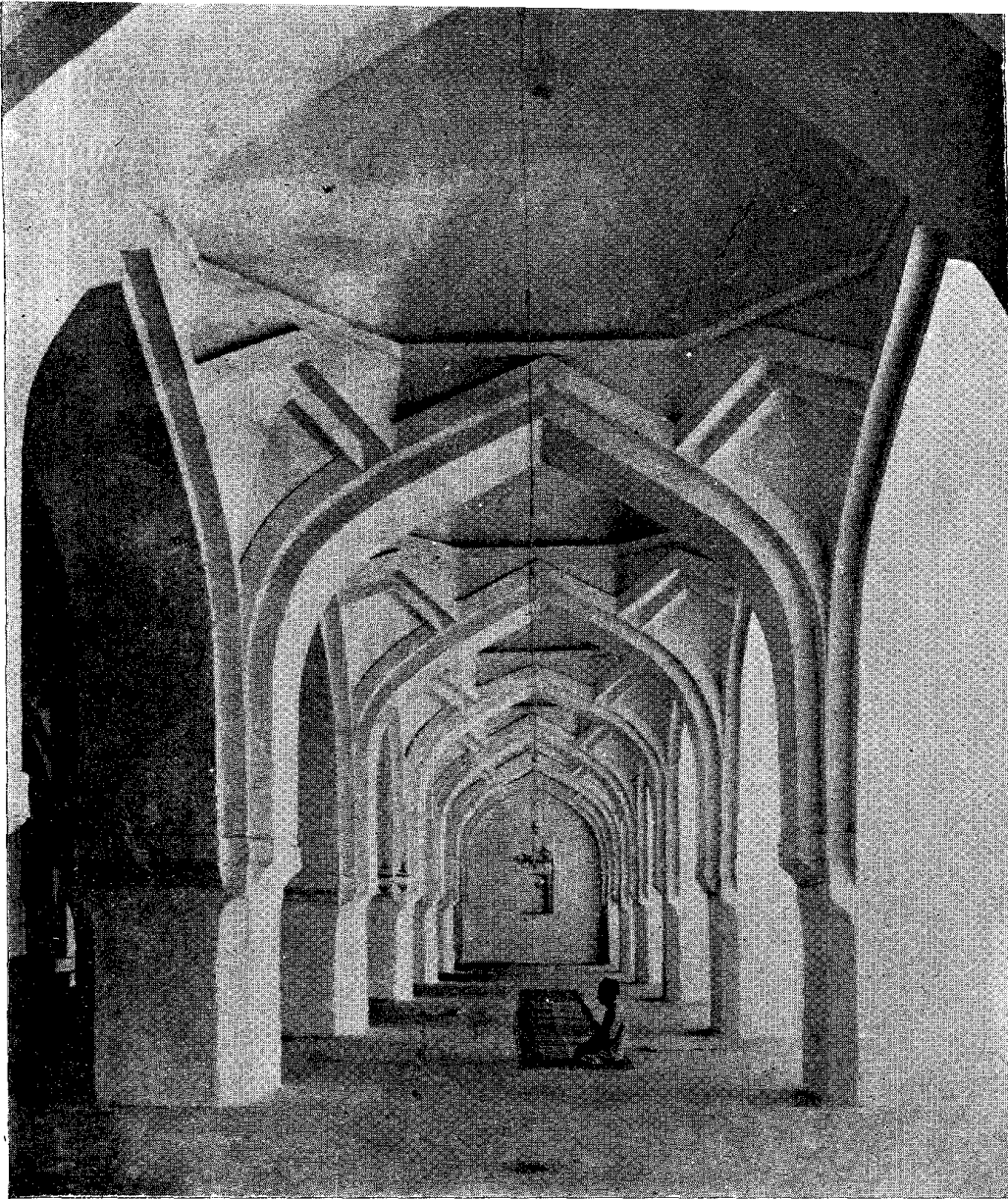

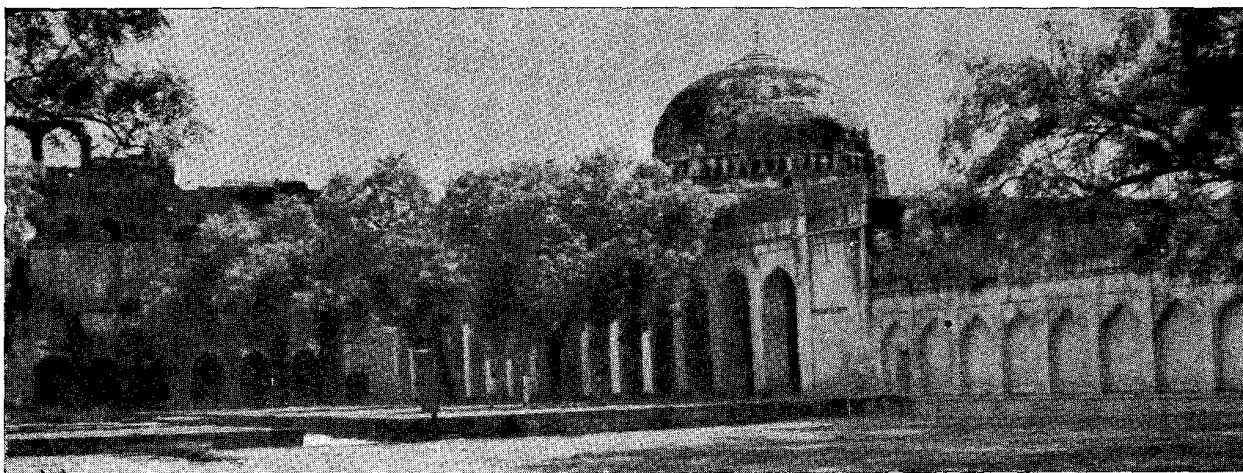

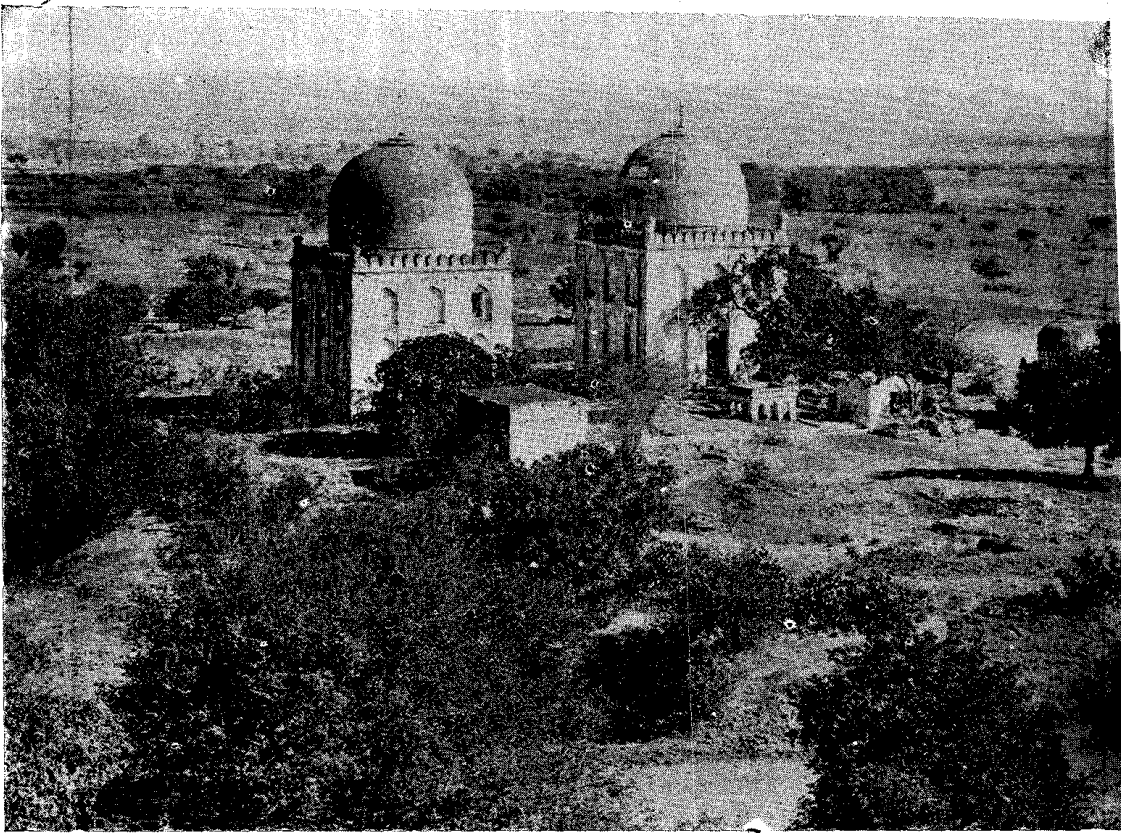

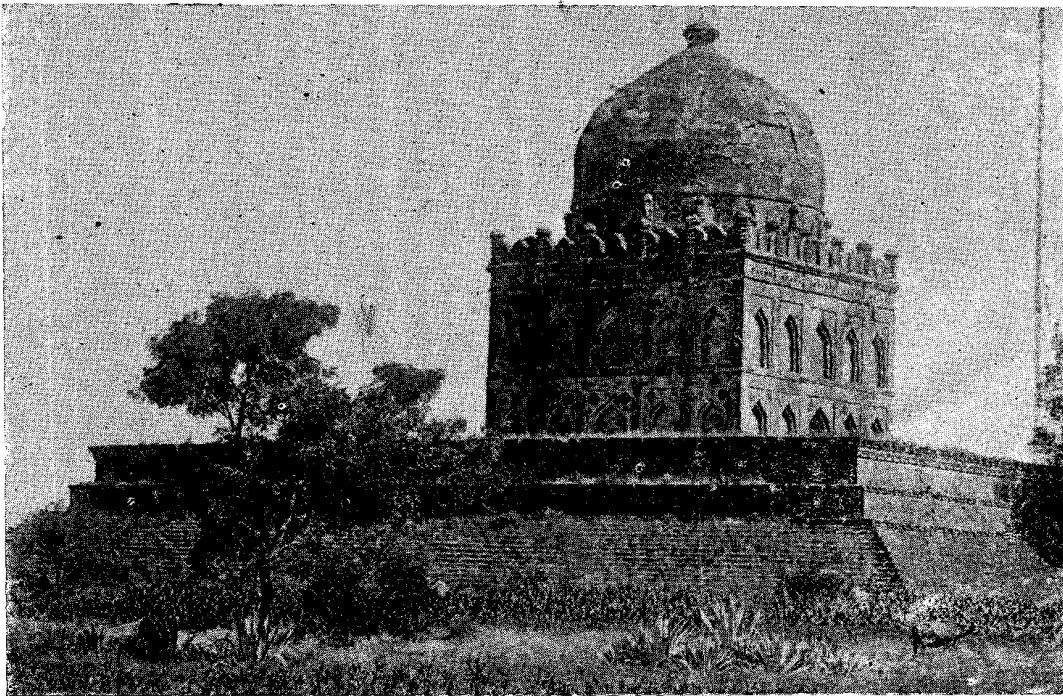

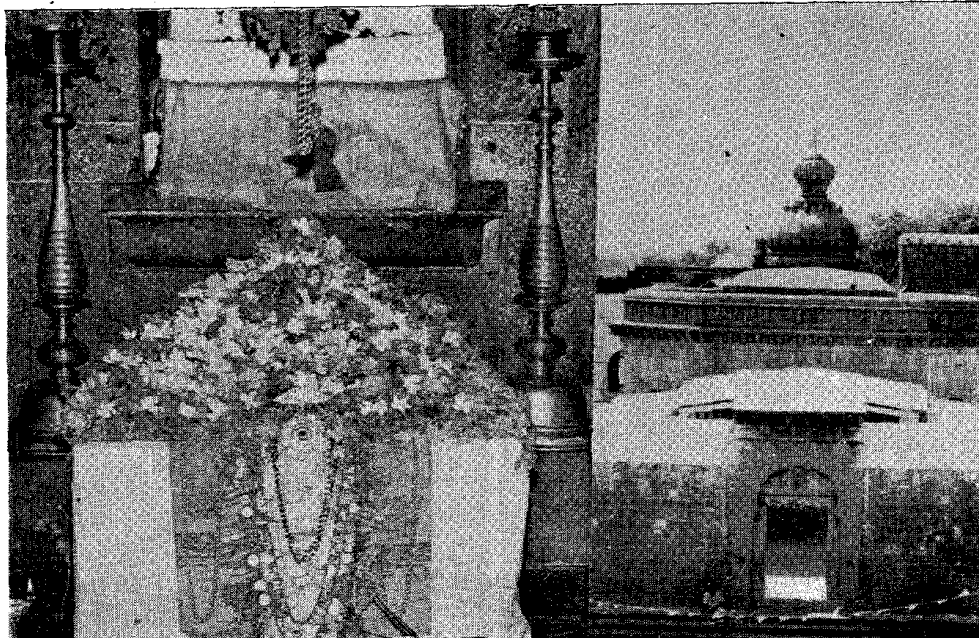

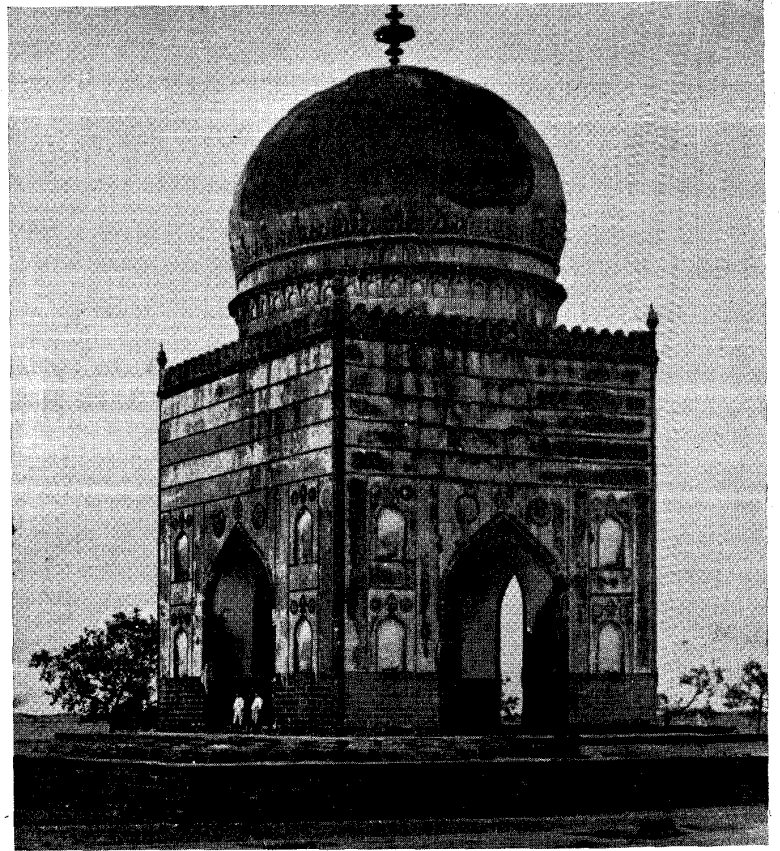

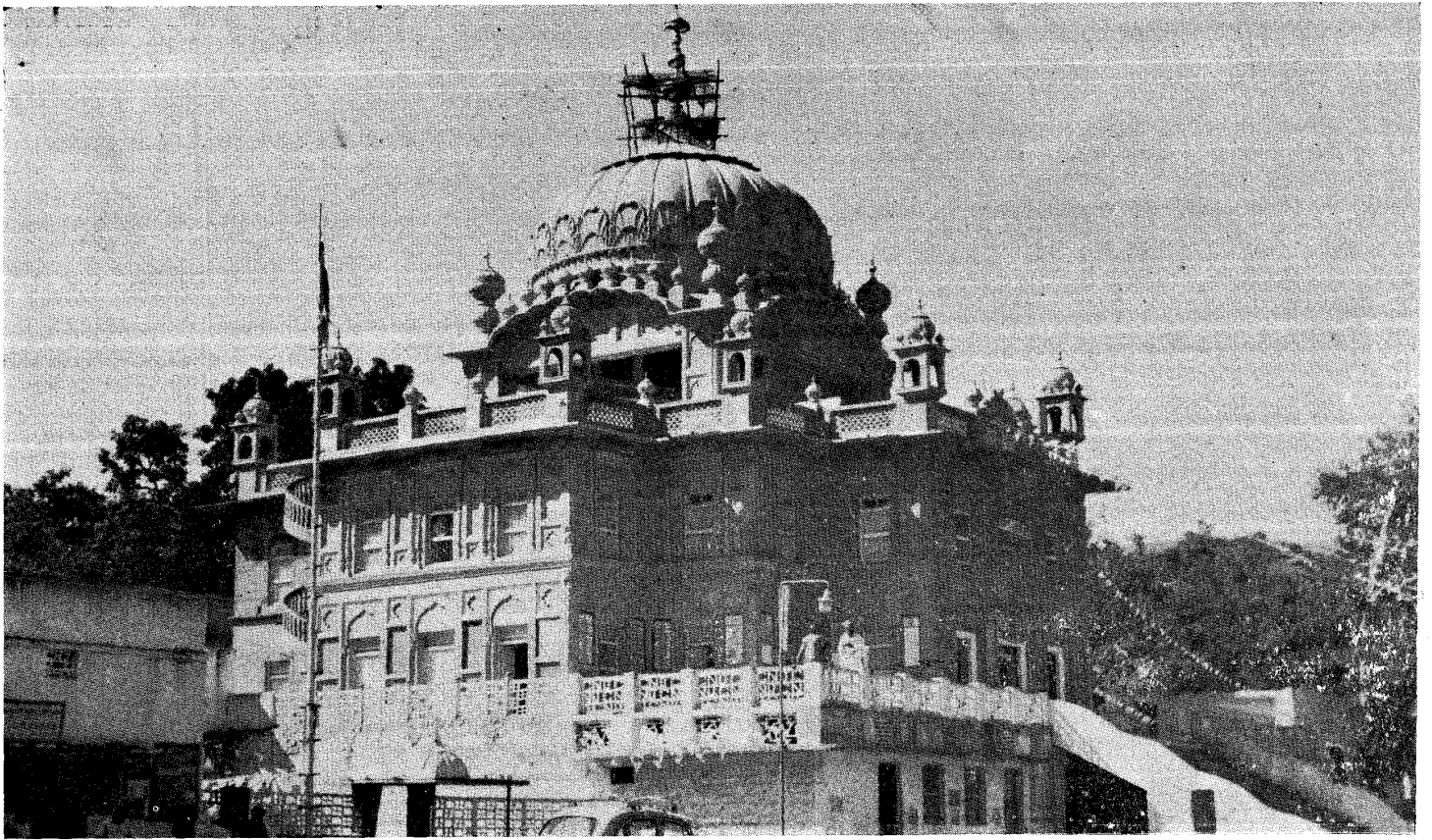

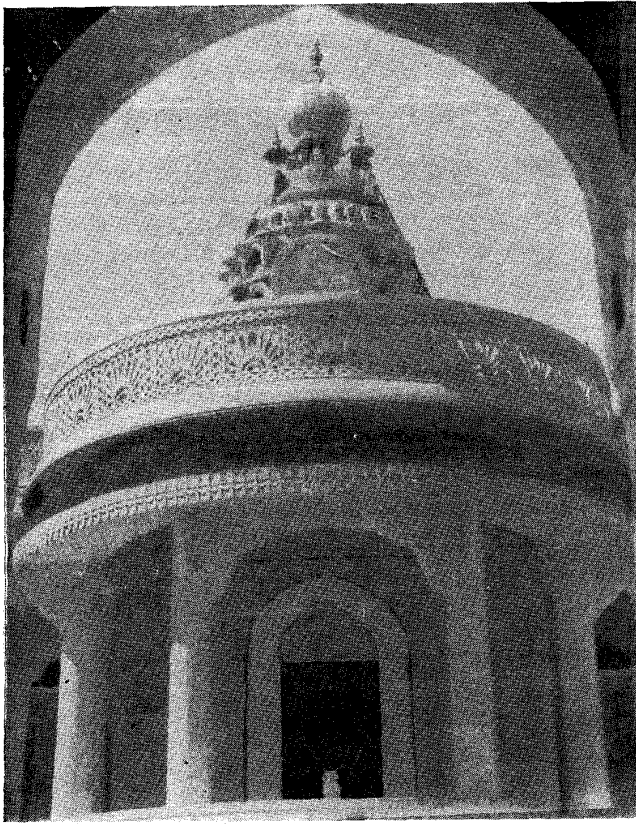

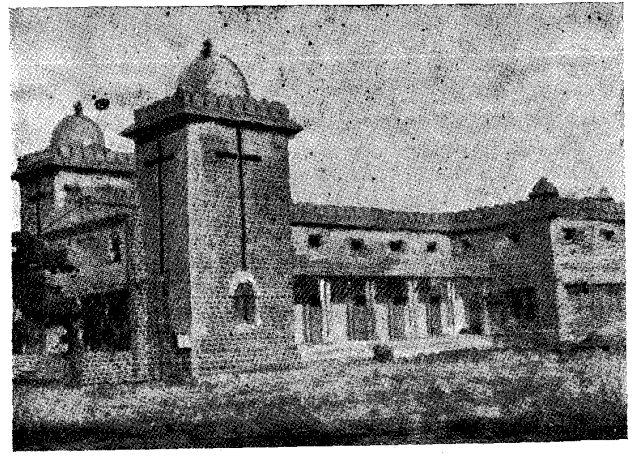

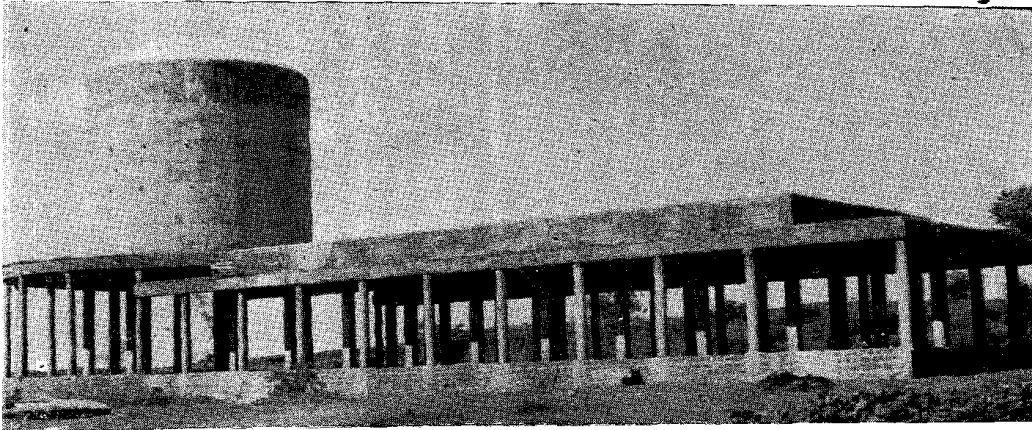

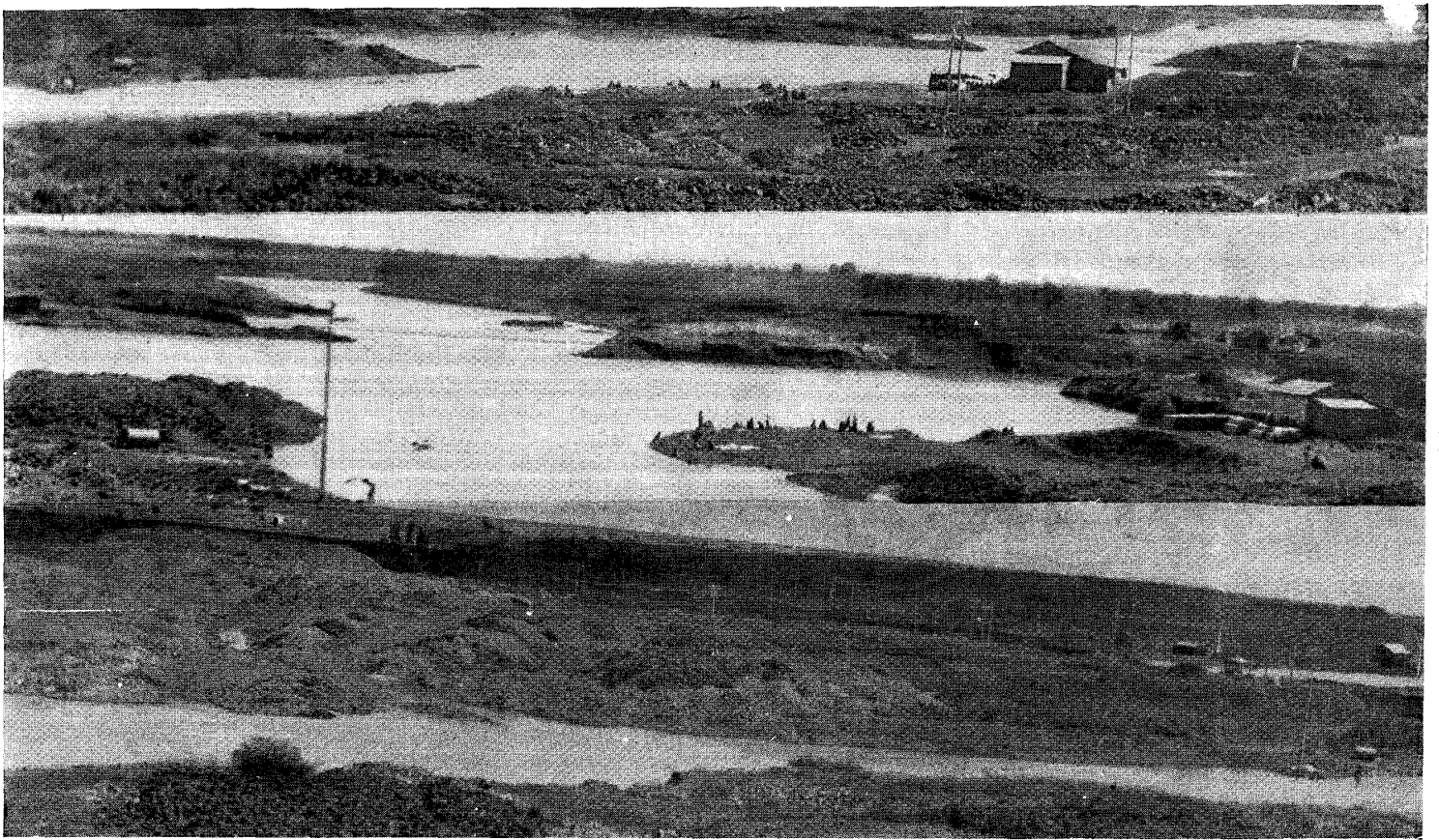

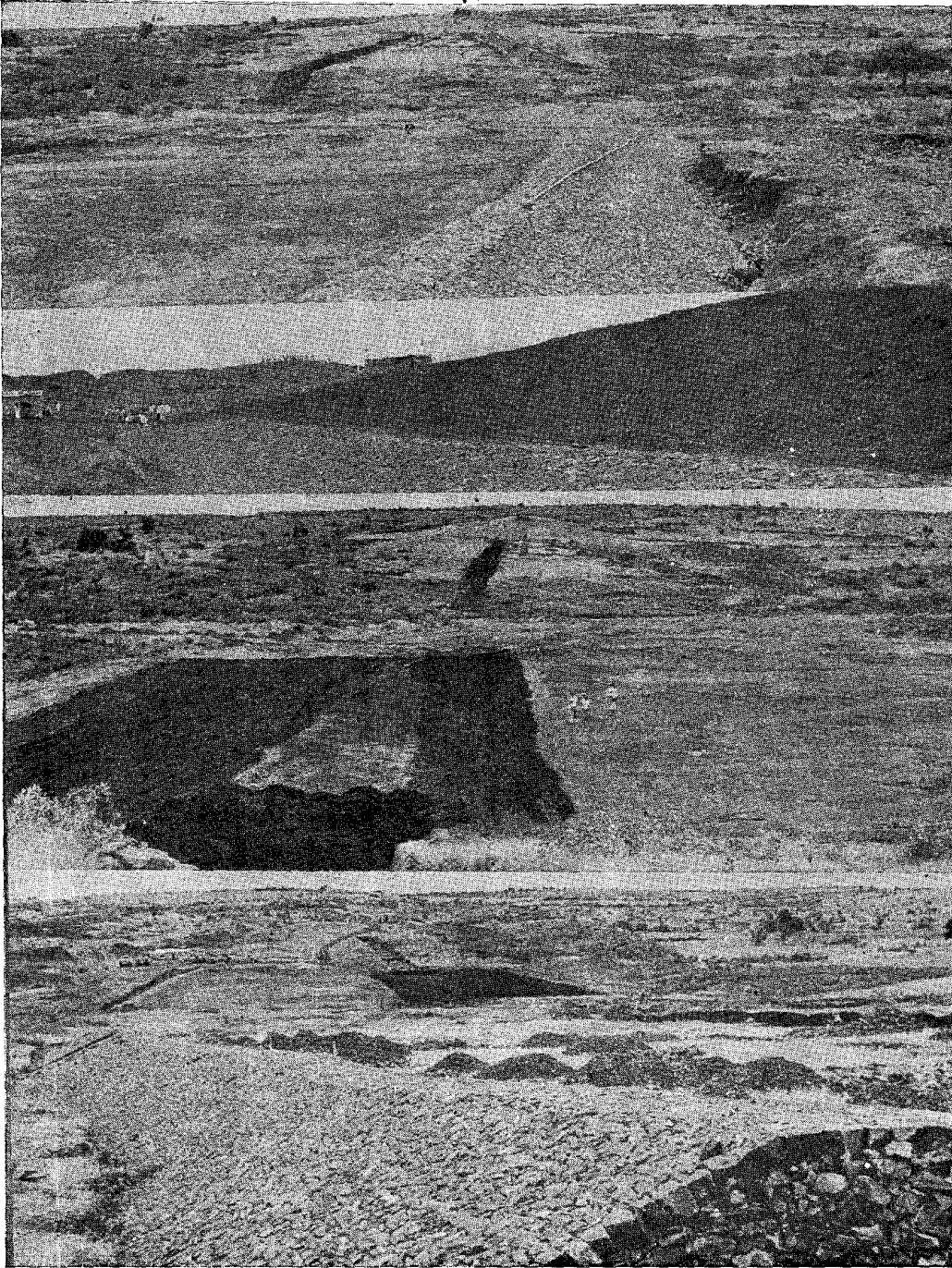

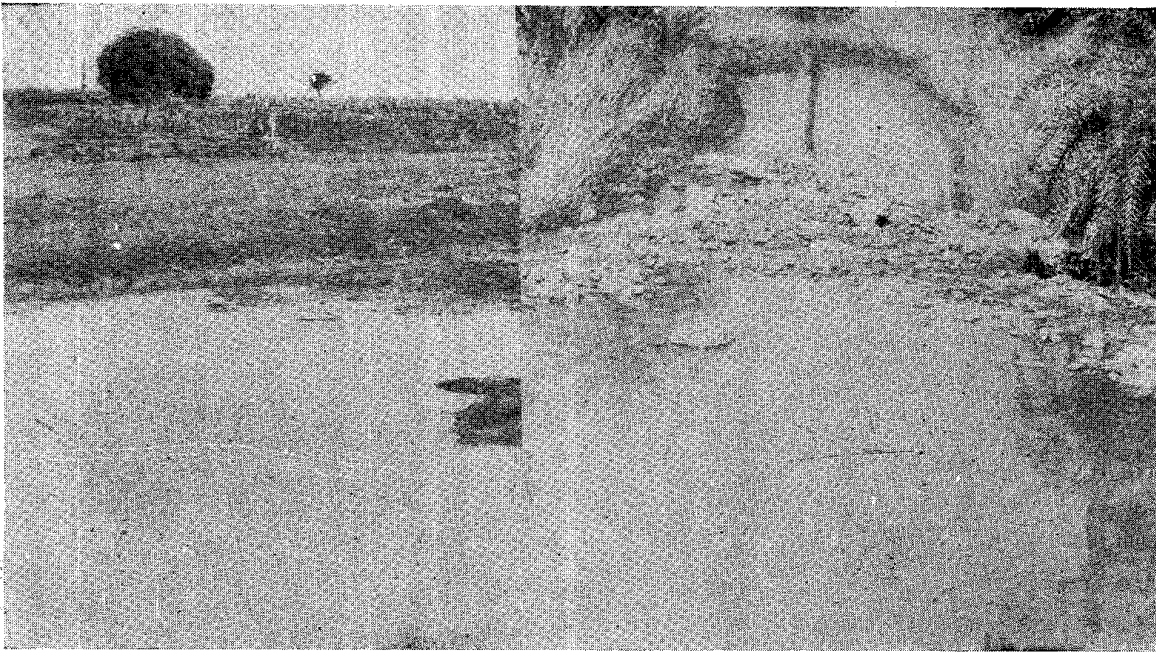

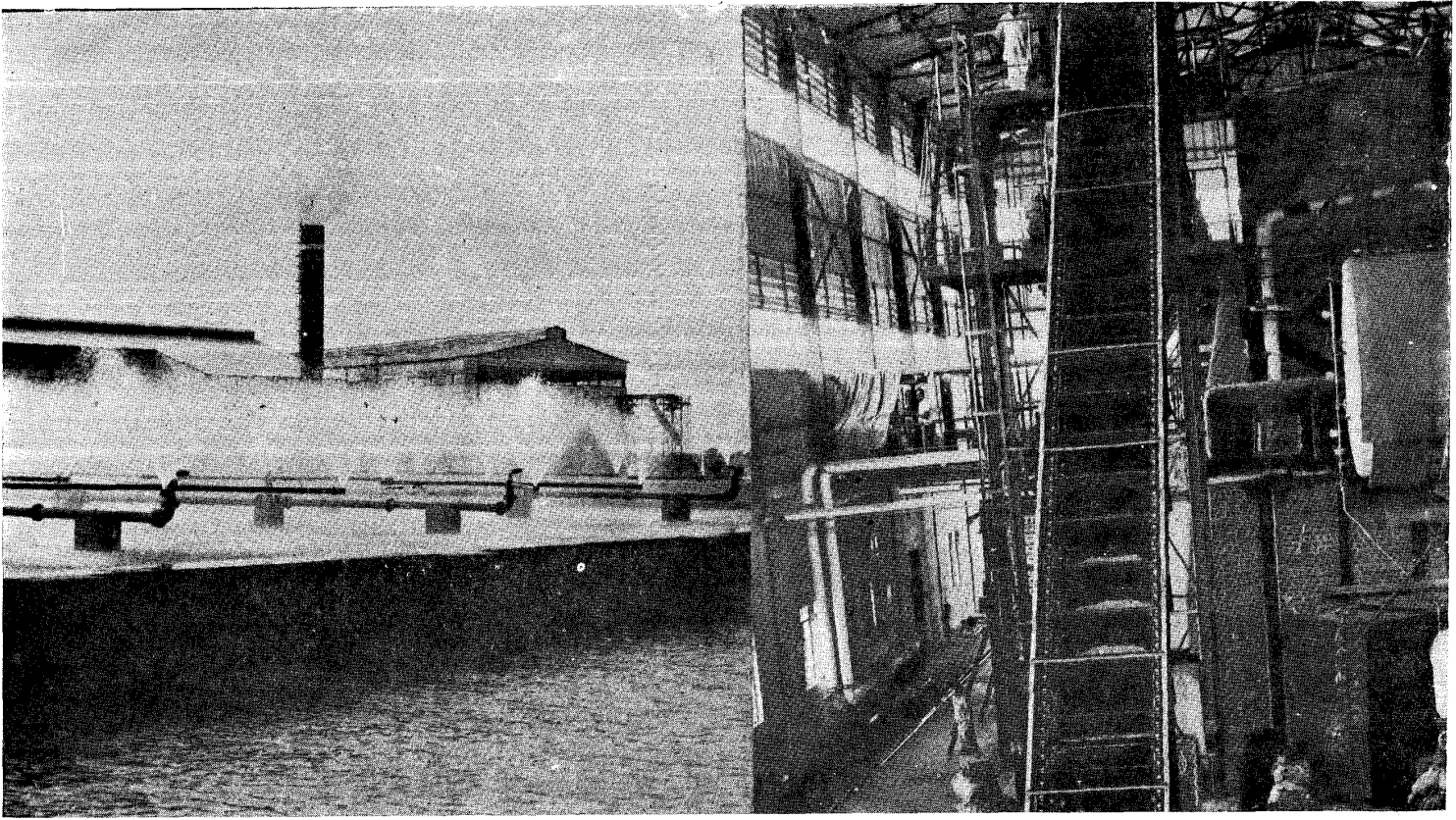

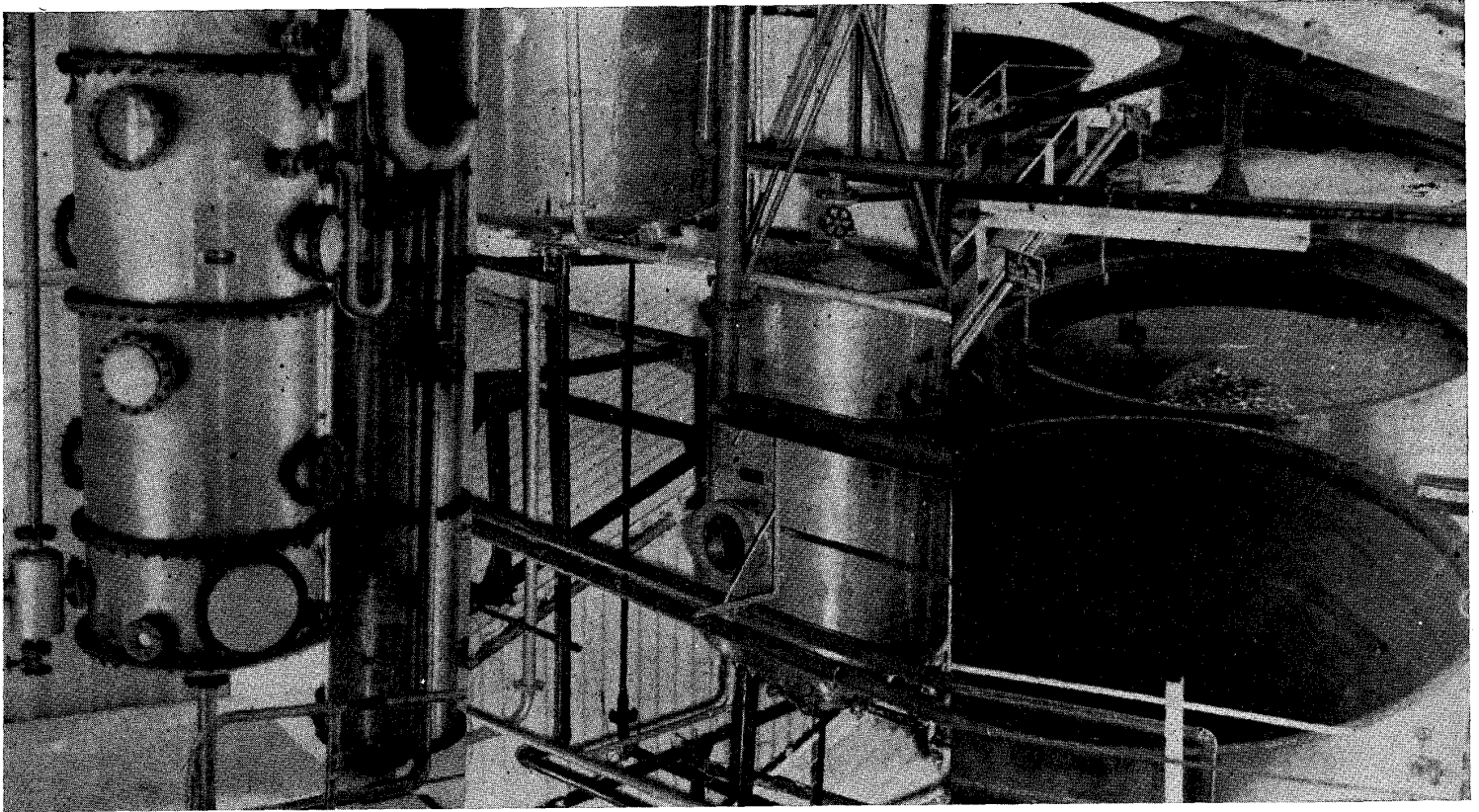

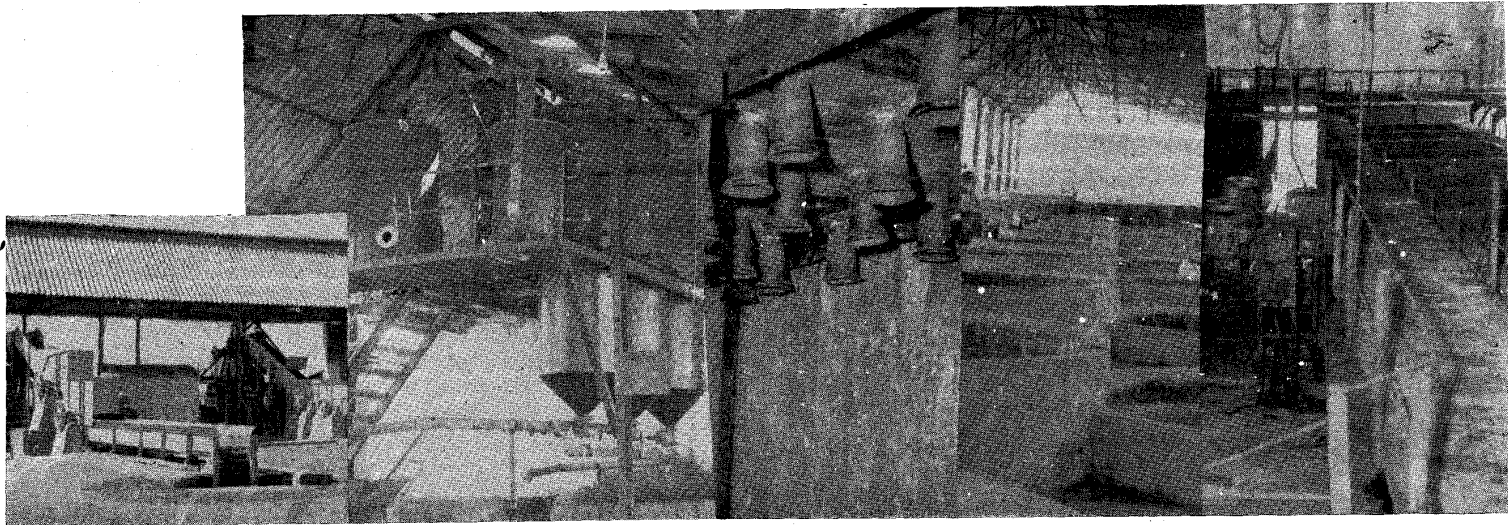

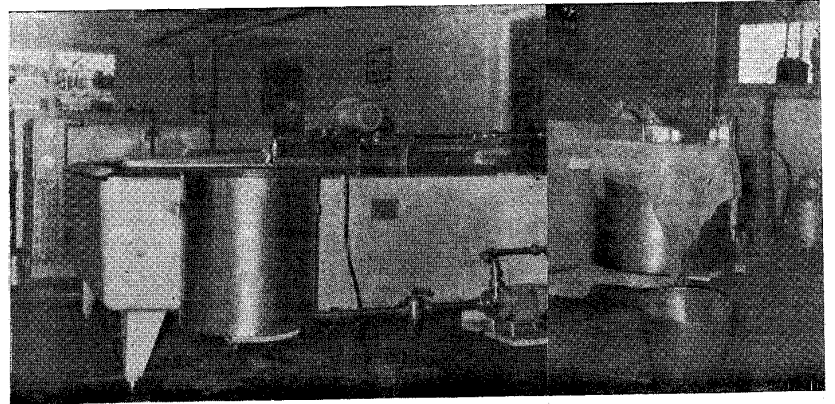

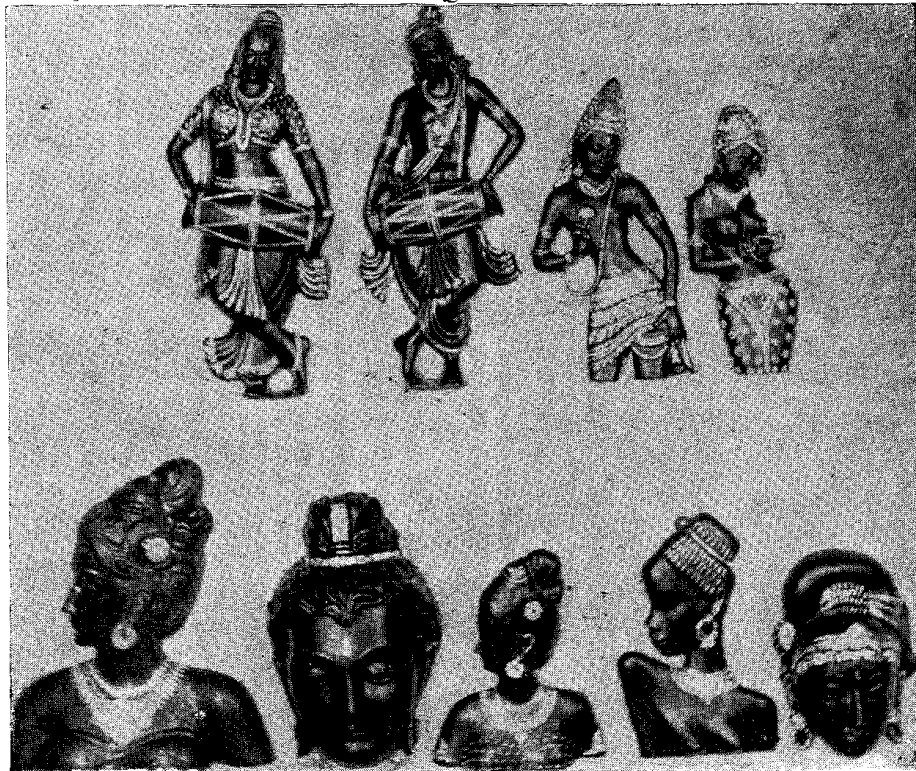

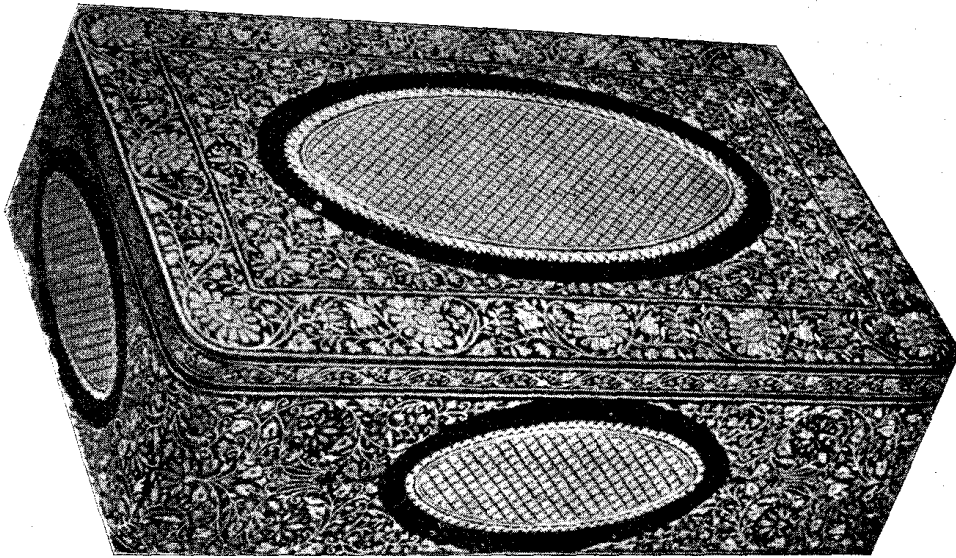

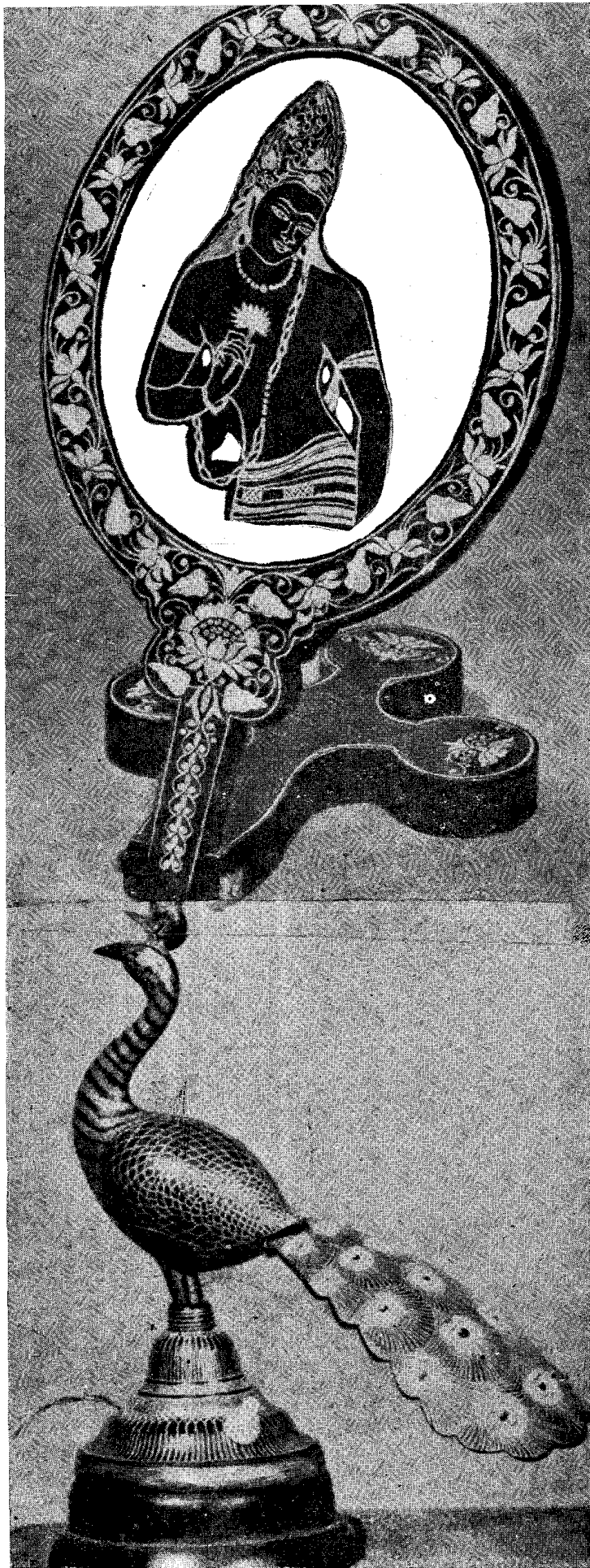

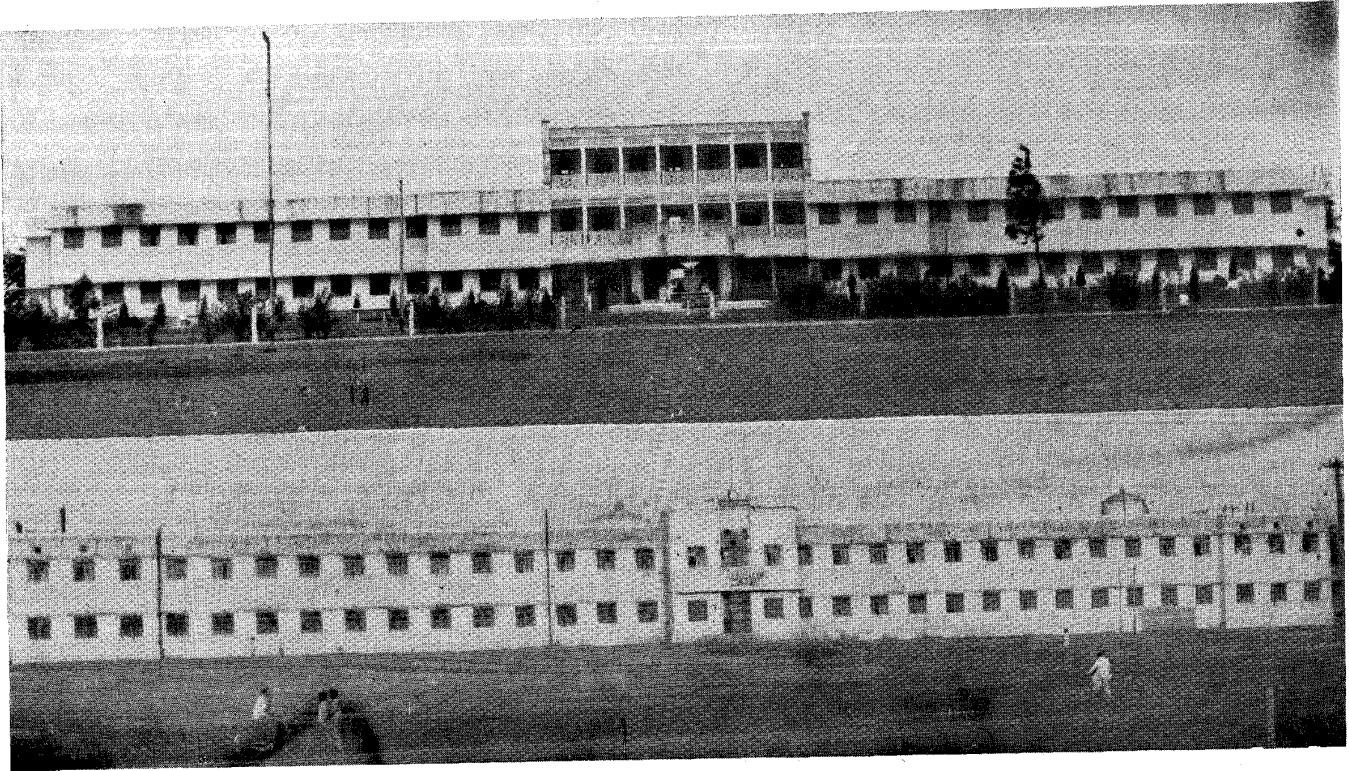

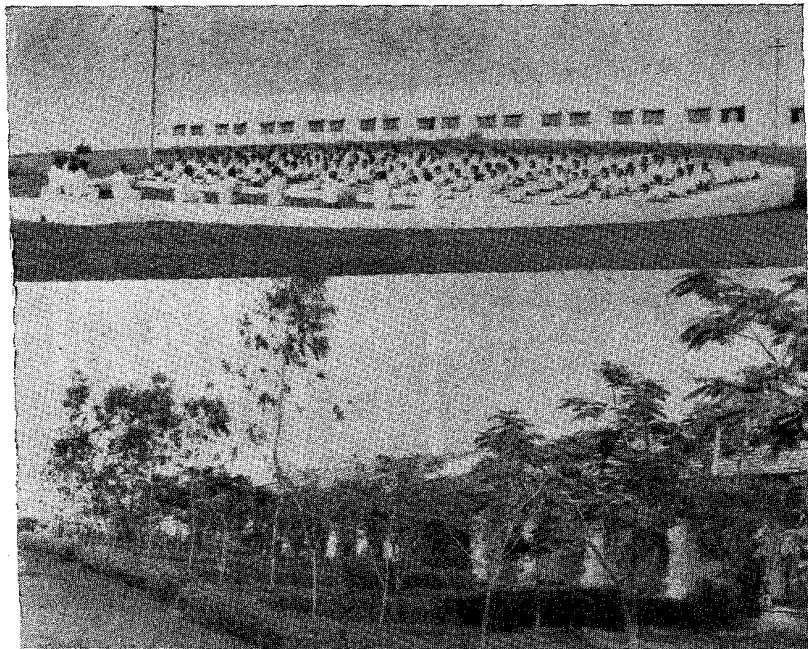

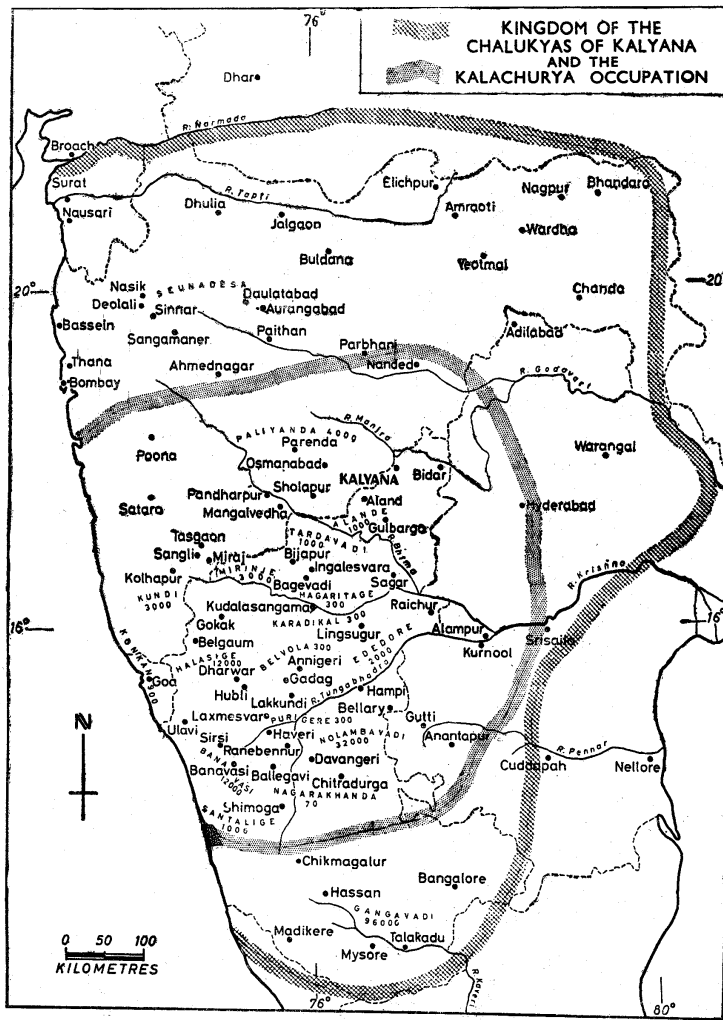

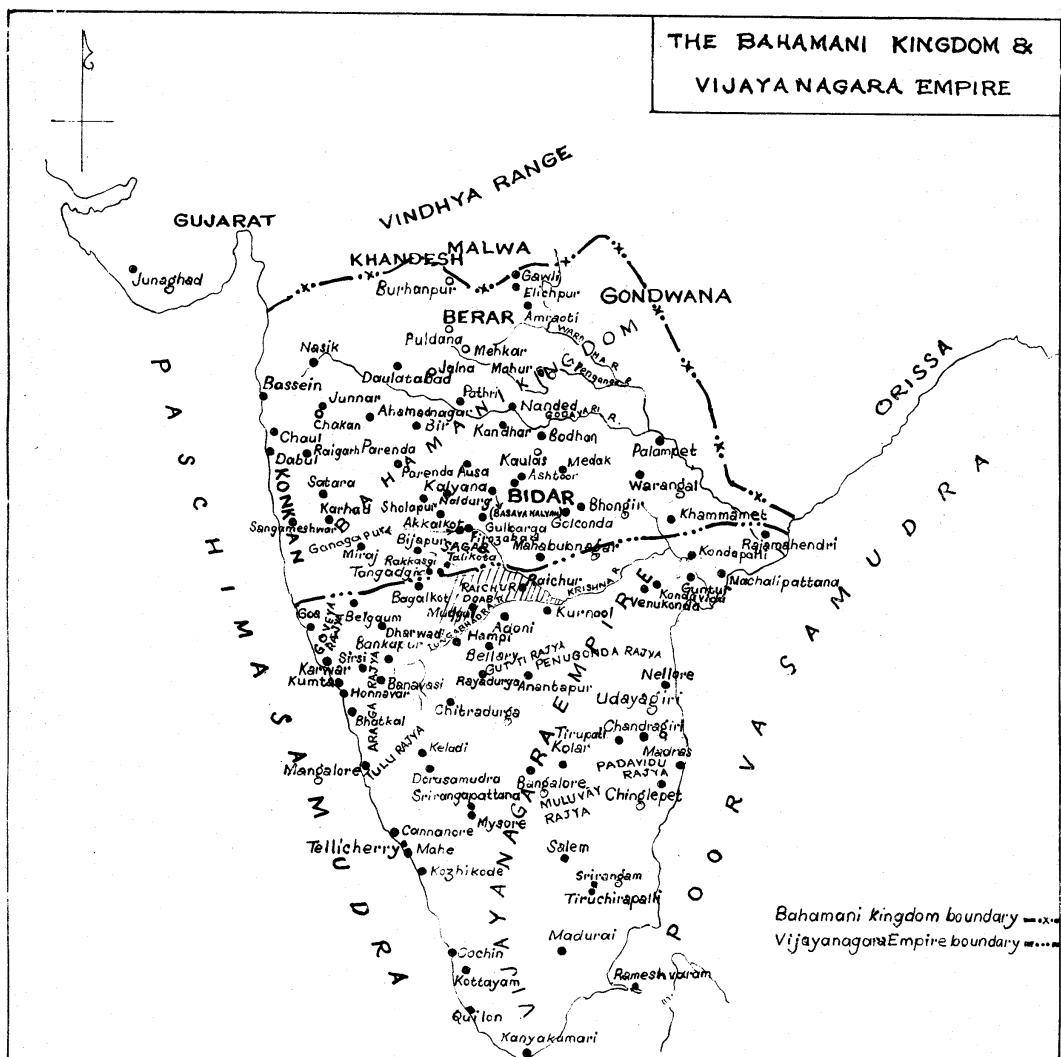

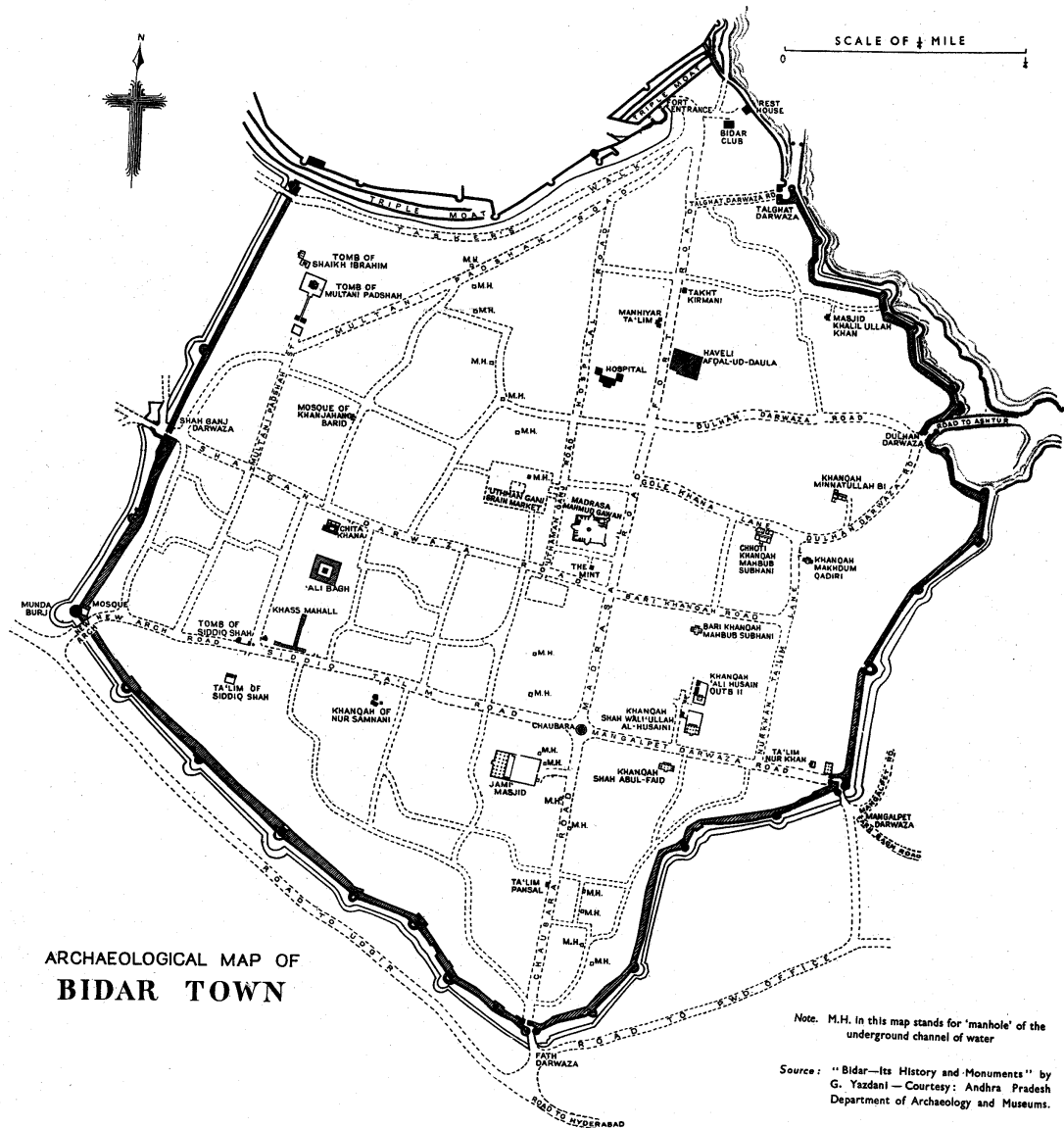

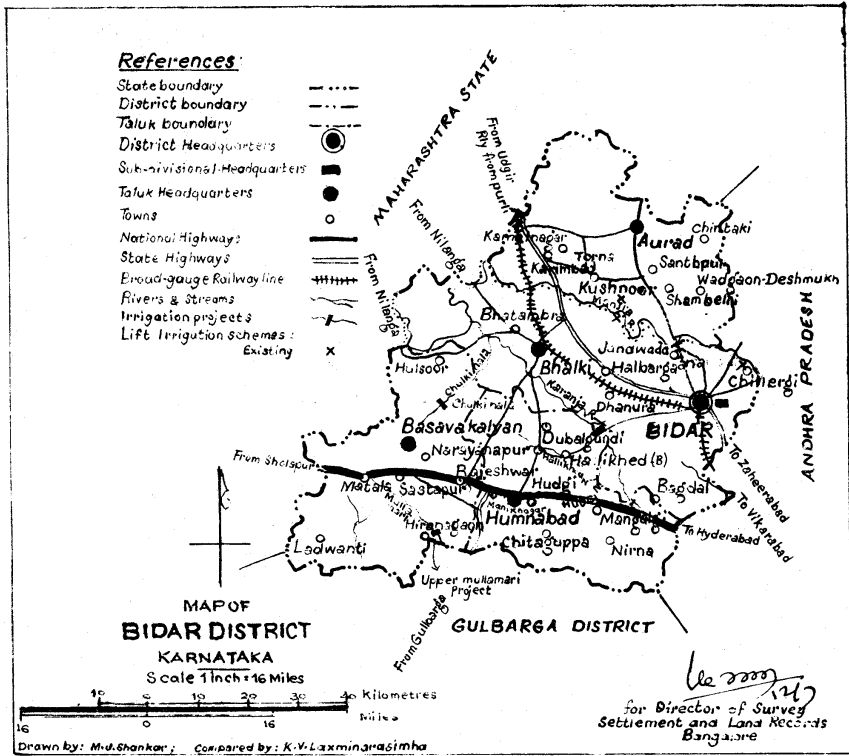




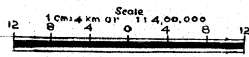
ARCHAEOLOGICAL MAP OF

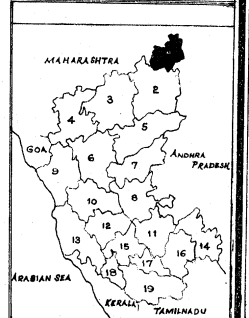
